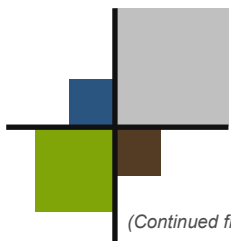

## *RV Tips & Tricks - Part 1*

- **Tip To Store A Portable Propane Tank:**  
Use a 12" x 12" milk crate to help keep the portable propane tank upright while traveling or when in use. The cylinder fits snugly inside.
- **LED Lights For Power Saving:**  
Replacing normal incandescent bulbs or fixtures with LED's can save exponential amounts of energy, as most LED's use one-tenth the amount of power of normal bulbs.
- **Tip Tire Pressure:**  
Check before every trip. Over inflation or under inflation can age the tires faster. It can make the ride or handling of a coach less comfortable and less safe. Under inflation can cause the tire to heat up and risk potential tire failure. This is also how tires degrade from within the tire. Refer to the manufacturer's loading sticker for loads and tire pressure located in the kitchen cabinet or near the driver's seat.
- **Tip Water Hook Up:**  
Turn on the fresh water through the fill hose before hooking up to the RV. This will wash out any sediment or other debris and not go into the RV plumbing.
- **Turn Breaker Off:**  
Before hooking up the power cord from the RV to the campsite power, be sure to turn off the breaker switch first for safety.
- **Tip Water Hose:**  
Carry an extra hose just in case one is not long enough to reach at the camp site.
- **Motorhome Tips and Tricks for Clean Hands:**  
Carry a box of disposable rubber gloves for use during sewer hookups and the dump station.
- **Co-Pilot:**  
Let your co-pilot learn to drive the RV and let him or her take the wheel often. Sharing the driving duties cuts down on driver fatigue while reinforcing the notion that RVing is for both of you. If the main driver should ever become sick or hurt, you won't be stranded.
- **Motorhome Tips and Tricks for RV Cover Storage:**  
I can never get my cover put into the provided storage bag. So, when not using my RV cover, I purchased the largest plastic trash can with a lid to store it in. Make sure it has wheels to roll it out of the way.

### 1. You'll Have to Store or Discard Most of Your Possessions

Before choosing the RV lifestyle, you must decide which is more important to you—your possessions or your desire to live a simpler, less burdensome life. Most people who become full-timers sell their homes and all but one of their vehicles (the one that either tows their travel unit or is towed by it). They also shed themselves of furniture, artwork, and anything else that takes up a lot of space.

Think about all of your hobby materials, holiday decorations, boxes of family photos, books, magazines, collectibles, pets, bulky electronics, excess clothing, duplicate household goods (e.g. second sets of dishes and silverware), decor items, heavy cleaning equipment (e.g. full-sized vacuum cleaners), duplicate tools, and recreational equipment (e.g. kayaks, skis, and clunky sports equipment). These are all things you will not have room to bring with you in your new mobile dwelling.

Some people find it difficult to make the transition all at once, so they put their belongings in storage units they can rent by the month. Those who are lucky enough to be able to place their belongings at the homes of family members or good friends usually buy storage sheds. In the long run, sheds are usually less expensive than renting a unit and are often more secure. A one-time purchase of a shed will pay for itself in a year or so, and it can be sold later in the event that you decide to return to living in a house or choose to sell off your remaining belongings because you feel your new lifestyle works for you.

Storing items makes people feel more secure and gives them an "out" if they change their minds about RV living. It also allows them to keep their most valued possessions without wasting space in their vehicle.

### 2. You Must Choose an RV That Meets Your Needs

When your living space is limited, comfort and privacy are important. You must make sure that the unit you select for full-time living is large

enough to serve your purposes and has everything you will need to keep yourself comfortable. Otherwise, you will be miserable.

Coaches are rated for living and traveling in various types of weather. It is best to choose an all-weather unit to ensure that it will hold up to temperature differences and be comfortable no matter its location.

If you join RV Consumer Group, you will be able to access books and magazines that provide temperature ratings and other important information for almost every make, model, and year of motor home or camper. It costs a good bit to do this, but it can save you money and help you avoid problems in the long run.

### 3. You'll Probably Want to Set Up a Home Base

Many people set up home bases by

- renting campsites on a long-term basis,
- purchasing a deeded RV lot, or purchasing and developing properly zoned land.

Doing this gives them a permanent address and provides a sense of security they might not otherwise be able to have. However, having a home base is not always necessary.

Some folks just rent as they go. In this situation, you generally pay nothing but a nightly, weekly, or monthly fee. Although this sounds simple, it can get pricey because campgrounds always charge more for short-term visits than they do for more extended stays.

On the other hand, people who choose not to set up a home base can often camp inexpensively or even for free at a number of locations. Before assuming you will be able to do this, be sure to do your research and find out how much it costs to park at any campgrounds you plan to visit and how long visitors are allowed to stay.

All parks require you to call individually, to make a reservation with your credit card.

Generally sites will not be held past 30 days prior to the rally. We recommend that you make reservations early.

August rally does not have a clubhouse.

For members no longer traveling with an RV there are cabins available at the May, June, July, September, October, and November rallies, and hotel rooms at the August rally.

Expect rallies to be open air (without clubhouse) weather permitting.
